#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Library is opened for students and staff from 8 am-7 pm on all working days except government holidays. In addition to the internet/online facilities in library, desktop access in various departments and multi-user access at central computer unit also have been set up. Electronic Public Access Catalogue (EPAC) is provided to access anywhere from the campus. Band width of 10 mbps dedicated line through BSNL provides increased speed for quick access by the users and to avail the facilities especially on articles and e journals downloading etc. The library has departmental libraries and self managed reading rooms in the department of Pharmaceutics, Pharmacology, pharmacy practice (in hospital), pharmaceutical chemistry, quality assurance and pharmacognosy for reference and for the benefit of the students. Library has been providing various services: Reference service, bound volumes (back issues), book bank, research and review printed journals/periodicals, magazines, CDs database, monographs, reports, e-journals, full text articles, free online research journals, news papers and news paper clippings, employment news, general knowledge books, grammar books, competitive exam guidance books/GATE/GPAT books, dictionaries, encyclopaedias, question papers hard and soft copies syllabus copies, overnight services, reprography service, thesis hard and soft copies, practical records/manuals etc.
